ROADS/FOOTPATHS/GROUNDS MAINTENANCE

Hopefully, now drainage works have been completed along Pilgrims Way, the regular flooding will stop and the road surface may last longer. KCC have agreed to install steps at the entrance of footpath MR179. This will make it safer for walkers exiting the footpath onto Knowle Road.

NO ENTRY INTO HIGH STREET

There seems to have been some confusion with the new signage. KCC had to change it to a new (NO MOTORISED VEHICLE) sign to enable bicycles and horses to come through. For those who are unsure, a motorised vehicle is a CAR, VAN, TRUCK, MOTORBIKE or HORSE BOX (who regularly comes through!)

The offence and fines associated with the prohibition of motor vehicles restrictions are still the same and can, AND ARE, being enforced by Kent Police in the same way.

DEFIBRILLATORS

The Parish Council have paid for 3 defibrillators in the village. They are located at: **THE VILLAGE HALL**, 15 High Street, **THE COMMUNITY CENTRE**, Tolhurst Close, Peters Village and outside **165 HIGH STREET**.

LIFEBOOYS

As we all live near a very fast-moving river, the Parish Council have paid for Lifebuoys along the river in Peters Village. It is vital that these are always fit for purpose. They are checked monthly by Councillors and should only be opened in case of emergency.

PUBLIC OPEN SPACES

DOG POO! Parks, footpaths, other people's gardens - we really need **ALL DOG OWNERS** to do their bit. Just because it's dark in the early mornings and evenings, or you are on your phone! - it doesn't mean that you don't need pick it up! Wouldham has the highest number of dog poo bins per person in the whole of the Borough, so there is no excuse not to use them! Volunteers regularly put bags around the village for **EMERGENCY** use. Please use these if you forget to take one out with you and **DO NOT** take handfuls (which people have been seen doing and is unfair on the volunteers who buy them for the benefit of the Parish).

WOULDHAM COMMON

There have been a number of issues regarding motorbikes and quad bikes wrecking the picnic area. Not only have they been churning up the ground, they have ruined the benches and intimidated other users/walkers. If you see anyone causing damage or fly tipping, please report to 101 with any evidence.

LOCAL PLAN - REGULATION 18 CONSULTATION

There has been a fantastic response from the Parish to the Local Plan consultation with just under 40 people attending the TMBC presentation and 111 people responding to the online consultation. Although Wouldham only has one new build site, the enormous amount of building in the surrounding areas will have a huge impact on Peters Village in terms of traffic travelling through the parish. TMBC are now considering the responses and will publish the Regulation 19 consultation on the final document Aug-Sept 2026.

Gardening Notes: February & March in Wouldham

The garden may still look quiet, but there is plenty happening beneath the surface.

February and March often feel like the turning point in the gardening year. The days are slowly lengthening, the light feels a little stronger, and the first signs of life begin to appear. Snowdrops, crocuses and early daffodils bring welcome splashes of colour, while hellebores hold their own in borders and pots. Even a brief walk into the garden can be uplifting at this time of year.

“Gardening at this time of year is about noticing more than doing.”

This is a good moment for **small, unhurried tasks** rather than major changes. Borders can be gently tidied, removing obvious dead growth while leaving seed heads and hollow stems in place to support wildlife. Fallen leaves can be cleared from lawns and paths, but added to the compost heap to break down naturally. On milder days, simply turning the soil lightly with a fork helps improve drainage without disturbing it too much.

Pots and containers benefit from some quiet attention now. Winter displays can be refreshed, compost topped up, and pots cleaned ready for spring planting. If you have empty containers, grouping them neatly or storing them away will help keep the garden looking cared for, even before new growth begins.

February and March are also ideal months for **gentle preparation indoors**. Seeds such as sweet peas, tomatoes and early vegetables can be sown on a windowsill or in a greenhouse. Labels, trays and pots can be sorted and cleaned — small jobs that make the busy months ahead feel more manageable.

Bird feeders should still be kept topped up, and fresh water provided where possible, as food sources remain limited. Taking time to watch the birds is one of the simple pleasures of late winter gardening.

Above all, this is a season for patience. The garden is waking up in its own time, and careful, quiet attention now will be rewarded as spring steadily unfolds.



Wouldham Football Club 1960 – 1961 (part 5)



At the beginning of March 1961 Wouldham FC were in a great position to capture the league title of the Maidstone and District Football League, but both Len Social and Snodland were also in strong positions in the table. On the eve of the Saturday 4 March Snodland were top with 25 points, Len Social second with 21 points, and Wouldham third with 15 points. Although ten points behind Snodland, Wouldham – due to success in cup competitions – had six games in hand over Snodland, and with two points for a win, the Kent Messenger (KM) succinctly captured the situation on Friday 3 March with the comment that 'Wouldham, last year's runners-up cannot afford to drop a single point if they are to catch Snodland.'

Saturday 4 March saw Wouldham travel to Maidstone, where they reduced the points difference against Snodland with a 4-1 win against Maidstone 'A' FC. Snodland had no game that Saturday so the gap was now reduced to eight points. (Only two points for a win were awarded in the 1960-61 season.)

Wouldham's success in cup competition had seen them reach the final of the Kent Junior Cup, (a game they lost 5-4 to Borough Green), and the semi-final of the Maidstone League's Challenge Cup 'A'. This last-four tie would be played later in March against Wouldham's league rivals Snodland, and following an eventful day of football on Saturday 11 March the KM noted 'Wouldham's chance of a notable double.'

The reason for this speculation was the 'shock 2-1 defeat' Snodland suffered against Coombe Estate at South Park, Maidstone. This result, and Wouldham's 4-2 win over Staplehurst (at Wouldham Rec) on the same day, reduced the points gap to six, increased the excitement in the local press, and added to the pressure on Snodland.

Now, the destination of the league title was in Wouldham's hands, if they won their remaining games they would be Maidstone & District League Chions.

There remained one more Saturday in March before the semi-final clash with Snodland, when on 18 March both Snodland and Wouldham won their league matches, Snodland defeated Hadlow 2-1, while Wouldham made what could be described as a 'statement win' with their 5-0 victory over second-placed Len Social, which saw them move past Len and into second place in the division table. By full-time on Saturday 18 March Snodland remained in first place with 27 points and Wouldham second with 13 points, and – crucially – five games in hand.

The following Saturday (25 March) brought a pause in league football in order to play rivals Snodland in the semi-final of the Challenge Cup. As noted above, Wouldham were on a hot streak of form in the league, while Snodland had suffered an unexpected defeat. The semi would also be the fourth meeting of the River Medway rivals so far in the season – Snodland had won in the first league encounter in the autumn, Wouldham had then knocked out Snodland from the Kent Junior Cup in January, and then in February the points had been shared with a 2-2 draw in the league.

The KM set the scene for the tie reporting on Friday 24 March that 'sparks should fly in this semi-final [as] only Snodland stand in the way of Wouldham completing the league and cup double.' The report concluded by describing the semi-final as 'the match of the season', such was the anticipation.

Bridging the Medway

Wouldham Bridging Camp and a Century of Royal Engineer Training

Tucked away along the River Medway, lies a site that once played a vital role in British military engineering. Known as WOULDHAM BRIDGING CAMP, this quiet riverside landscape trained generations of Royal Engineers in the art of military bridging — skills that would prove essential in conflicts across the world.

Established in the 1860s, the camp was chosen for its ideal natural conditions. The Medway provided a challenging water obstacle, perfect for practising “wet bridging” techniques using pontoons, trestles and temporary military bridges. Each year, sappers returned to WOULDHAM to train under realistic field conditions, often battling mud, tides and weather.

“Wouldham was where theory met reality — bridges were built, tested, and rebuilt again.”

In its early years, the camp was largely tented, with soldiers living in temporary accommodation during training seasons. Over time, the site expanded to include kitchens, ablution blocks, workshops and administration huts, evolving into a semi-permanent military facility.



During the Second World War, bridging became a critical battlefield skill. Engineers trained at WOULDHAM went on to construct river crossings under enemy fire across Europe, enabling armoured advances and supply routes. After the war, the camp briefly served as Prisoner of War Camp No. 654A, before returning to its original training role.

By the 1960s, WOULDHAM had become the EASTERN COMMAND BRIDGE TRAINING CAMP, hosting year-round exercises and equipment trials. Advanced bridging systems, including Bailey bridges and heavy ferry equipment, were assembled and tested on the Medway's shifting waters.

Despite its importance, the camp eventually closed, and its buildings were dismantled. Today, only subtle traces remain — foundations, earthworks, and faint paths visible in old aerial photographs.



Though largely forgotten, WOULDHAM BRIDGING CAMP remains a powerful reminder of the unseen places that supported Britain's military efforts — where practical skill, teamwork and engineering ingenuity quietly shaped history.


